

## SOUTH AFRICAN SWEDEN UNIVERSITY FORUM (SASUF) WORKSHOP

The SASUF workshop was held in May with the aim of understanding the Burden of Diseases for Maternal and Child Health in KwaZulu-Natal.

The objectives of the workshop were to develop a collaborative research, education and training programme between the participating institutions to investigate the burden of diseases, and also to enhance the monitoring and evaluation of the target indicators of Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) 3 and 4; with specific reference to maternal and child health, and to promote internationalisation.



### SCIVAL AND SCOPUS WORKSHOPS



During April, the RCD Office, in collaboration with the university library organised two workshops.

The first was on how to use SciVal to analyse research performance. Information from the workshop will assist the university in visualising research performance, benchmarking relative to peer institutions, developing strategic partnerships and identifying and analysing new and emerging research trends.

With the Scopus workshop, there were discussions on smart strategies to find and reference the best literature; staying up to date in one's field, determining the quality of a journal and using metrics to evaluate the impact of research.

#### RESEARCH INFORMATION **MANAGEMENT (RIM)**


At RIM, we oversee the institutional report to Department of Higher Education and Training on DUT's research publications. We also report research information to both internal and external stakeholders. Thus far, the office has completed the reporting of institutional research outputs to DHET as per the annual closing date of 15 May.

A project (ELEMENTS) managed by the RIM office to bring a system for the administration and management of research publications is complete for the institutional roll of the new reporting cycle for 2019 publications.

As of I June 2019, all research publications will be logged via ELEMENTS. Workshops and training are available to encourage adoption of the system by DUT researchers. The DUT's RIM office is the first to have explored Symplectic Elements as an administration system, and we are currently in talks with three other institutions seeking to join so we can form a consortium and receive optimal benefits from the system and service provider.
